Who represents your Club at Zone meetings?

n the past it wasn't always clear how club representation worked at Zone meetings. There were also differing views on how voting should work: Delegate voting like at the national AGM? Or one vote per person? Or one vote per club?

At the 2023 AGM a remit was approved that says a Zone Committee now means "the Zone Officers plus all the representatives as appointed by clubs in the Zone" (clause 23 a) i). So it's a club representative rather than a club delegate that represents a club at zone meetings.

And it is intended that there will not be delegate voting at Zone meetings.

More details on all this will be in the new Standing Orders that are being drafted.

Meanwhile any comments from members about this can be sent to <u>projects@nzfwda.org.nz</u> for the Remit Subcommittee to look at.

Auckland's Muriwai Beach has been in the news quite a lot recently as a result of heavy rain over the summer months and the subsequent landslides. Prior to that, the news items were largely about driver behaviors on the beach and the sand dunes.

Back in 2001 a news item in the NZ 4WD magazine, July edition, was about a beach clean effort supported by the Land Rover Owners (Auckland) Club and Auckland 4WD Club. On that occasion over eight trailer loads of rubbish was taken off the beach. Again, this year the clubs will again be out on Muriwai on 8 October to do what's been an annual event since 2000, except for one weather caused cancellation and the interruption of COVID.

Fortunately, the quantity of rubbish has been steadily reducing each year, so it will be interesting to see what this year brings, remembering that the beach itself has had restrictions on vehicle access since Cyclone Gabriel in February. Full access to Muriwai Beach was reinstated on 4th of September.

BRAKING THE HABIT....

Many of you reading this will be familiar with loss of braking... water, brake fluid collapse, overheating, mechanical or human error. It is the latter which has come to the attention of the NZFWDA in recent times.

Reports, too many it seems, have been trickling in principally relating to the loss of braking in automatic vehicles. The common threads seem to be when a vehicle is left idling in drive or park brakes simply not holding on their own.

It is all the more important that this issue is recognised because of the terrain we find ourselves in, the often less than ideal positions we have to stop in – up or down hill slopes, sidlings or maybe even more benign situations like the driveway at home or the local street.


Regardless, the hazards of unbraked vehicles are very real and have the potential for injury to friends or family, fellow four wheel drivers or third party people who become unwitting victims of rollaways. We can blame the mechanical failures or foibles of individual vehicles but we do know these and blaming the vehicle rather than the driver is small comfort to those who end up on the receiving end. This without even beginning to explore the consequences of possible vehicle damage.

Good practice can help prevent unwanted rollaways. Ensuring the hand brake is actually applied, turning the vehicle off and leaving in gear or in 'Park' when unattended is the easiest intervention. Some competition vehicles or highly modified vehicles rely on being able to use the auto to hold it in place for a number or reasons we won't go into here though these are the exceptions. But even with these be sure anyone else involved with the vehicle knows the consequences of turning off the ignition and the resulting loss of any holding capacity of the auto transmission.

Situational awareness is equally important. Regardless of braking, vehicles can slide on even the most gentle of wet greasy slopes when parked and idling. Pets can dislodge handbrakes and gear sticks. Never leave young children unattended in a vehicle. If a vehicle might let go think about where is it likely to end up. If your vehicle isn't mechanically safe to take out then keep it at home. On the trail no-one is interested in excuses when it all goes wrong. It is always up to you, the driver.

Recently in Australia there was a safety recall made on a particular brand of snatch recovery strap sold through Mitre-10 outlets and other hardware outlets. The media headline in Australia was "Safety straps used by 4WD drivers recalled over safety concerns. The product has been missing a piece crucial to the users safety and could cause severe injury or death."

Sounded rather dramatic but reading on, the crucial piece missing was actually a permanent safety warning label on the actual strap and no instructions on the safe use included with the strap. Seems a bit over the top as the actual strap is not considered unsafe, just missing that warning label. Australia has 'Product Safety Australia', which is part of the Australian Competition & Consumer Commission which has regulated a mandatory standard for motor vehicle recovery straps that came into effect in October 2010. The mandatory standard requires that motor vehicle recovery straps manufactured or imported after 1 October 2010 (and all recovery straps supplied after 1 January 2011) carry prominent labelling and warnings to promote safe usage of the product. The standard applies to "recovery straps, also called snatch straps, used to connect two vehicles when one vehicle is freeing another from being bogged. The straps stretch and release energy under tension to achieve a sharp, jerking action."

The regulations came about due to "at least two fatalities and one serious injury that had occurred in Queensland since 2003 to 2010 as a result of the unsafe use of recovery straps. Incorrect attachment to tow bars and tow hooks have resulted in the tow hooks being sheared from vehicles and recoiled at force, striking and fatally injuring onlookers. Anecdotal evidence suggests that there have been many more incidents involving non-fatal injuries."

The regulations state the strap must be permanently labelled with the name or logo of its Australian manufacturer, importer, distributor or other supplier; its batch code or serial number: its minimum breaking strength, expressed in metric units; a recommendation that the minimum breaking strength of the strap should be between 2 and 3 times the vehicle's gross vehicle mass (GVM); advice that the strap must be suited to the GVM of the lighter of the 2 vehicles used in the recovery process, plus a specific warning as supplied by the commission.

Nowhere do the regulations require mention the type of material used in manufacture of the snatch strap, and in my mind there lays the problem.

New Zealand doesn't have any such regulations over the 4WD recovery snatch straps sold in NZ however I'm not sure a label on the strap would make it any safer in actual use. I have a bigger problem with the actual material used in the production of the snatch strap as there are 4WD snatch recovery straps marketed within NZ that are made from Polyester which does not have any stretch to remove shock loading from the recovery points.

A little research of rope and fibre



manufacturers on the internet will find they say that polyester has little or no stretch and in fact the advantages and characteristics of Polyester are provided as; low stretch; high strength and high break load; and high UV and abrasion resistance (superior to nylon). This means when using polyester straps for snatch recovery you end up shock loading the recovery points on both vehicles and this can have disastrous consequences if one or other of the recovery points fail. However the characteristics and advantages of nylon, the strongest man-made fibre in common use, are that it has excellent shock absorption, is not affected by wide variations in temperature, and is very elastic, high elongation, stretching up to 46% before breaking. This means that its takes the shock loading out of a snatch recovery and allows the use of the kinetic energy build up to assist in the recovery of the stuck vehicle, if proper techniques are followed.

One of the largest manufacturers of off road equipment and accessories in the Southern Hemisphere, states that Snatch straps are typically manufactured from high elongation nylon webbing. Also the thickness,





width and weave all play a part in allowing the strap to stretch and absorb the energy involved in a recovery. What is very important is that by the simple nature of stretching, shock loads on recovery points are reduced, and the stored kinetic energy helps recover the vehicle. Snatch straps are typically designed to stretch by at least 20%. The more they stretch the less shock is placed on the recovery point. Therefore a snatch strap rated for a heavy vehicle won't stretch sufficiently to reduce the shock loading on recovery points.

Around 10 years ago Supercheap Auto were selling the Ridge Ryder branded 4WD equipment including snatch recovery straps, and 4WD recovery straps which along with winch extension straps and tree protectors, are all made from Polyester, a synthetic fibre that has no stretch and made in China. They also marketed a "Ridge Ryder 4WD Recovery Snatch Strap" that was 100% nylon webbing with a quoted "20% genuine stretch" but at a higher cost. Both had guideline instructions for use that were virtually the same word for word and were almost identical looking products with similar descriptions most would naturally choose the cheaper option.

A fellow four-wheeler new to the recreation did exactly that 10 years ago and learned the hard way about shock loading recovery points.

If you are unsure when buying a snatch strap as to if its Polyester or Nylon, then go to the professionals like Cookes Ropes who are rope and webbing experts and actually manufacture the Snatchmaster Recovery strap in NZ and have been doing so for over 25 years. They even offer discounts to 4WD club members.



WHAT IS THE LVVTA

The Low Volume Vehicle Technical Association (LVVTA) enhances road safety for New Zealanders by developing and administering standards for modified and individually constructed vehicles, and the associated low volume vehicle certification system. This system enables enthusiasts and the vehicle modification industry to continue to modify and build vehicles with public safety at the heart of the system.

LVVTA is an association of member associations, ranging from

classic and sports cars to motor homes and disability vehicles. It has a combined total membership of around 160,000 members.

Robert Buchanan is Chair of the LVVTA board, and has had a lifelong career in public law. Tony Johnson was instrumental in establishing LVVTA in 1992 and has been its Chief Executive Officer for over 20 years.



National Public Relations Officer Report

National Public Relations There's another article in Trail Torque about getting involved in 'community works' but from a public relations position there is a big gap in our messaging, and that's being able to reach that large body of four wheelers who don't like rules.

Our recreation has become remarkably popular with vehicle enthusiasts, but less so with many people in the wider community. Almost every week, there are now news items identifying problems created by vehicles off road.

The one-hundred-dollar question is, how do we reach those 'enthusiasts' and get their attention?

It's not something that one person can do, so somehow, we all need to consider how that might be achieved. There are so many places that four wheelers currently are presently able to access that are very much at risk of being closed off to us, because of poor personal behavior and non-sustainable damage to the environment.

Back 20 years ago in South Africa, that government took dramatic action to try to rein in the impacts of four wheeling on their beaches and backcountry, by banning beach driving and restricting driving on backcountry tracks, unless a training course had been completed, or in a group guided by a trained guide.

That triggered an urgent effort by the various 4WD groups to collaborate in an effort to soften the effects of such rules. They formed a national body and established training protocols

that included the publication of a 4x4 Driver Training Manual. I understand that beaches are still largely off limits, but the back road use is a little more relaxed now.

It would be a severe blow to our recreation if things were to get to that point here in NZ and we must endeavor to ensure that we don't find ourselves dragged into that situation by uninformed 4x4 owners.

Which brings me back to that question, how do we reach those 'enthusiasts' and get their attention?
